- **To vote for a write-in candidate:** completely darken the oval (●) to the left of the blank line and write in the candidate's name. Only votes cast for candidates who filed as write-in candidates can be counted.
- Do not write in a candidate's name if that person's name already is printed on the ballot for that same contest.
- **Before casting your ballot, if you make a mistake or want to change your vote:** return your ballot to an election official and get a new ballot. You may ask for a new ballot up to two times.
- **Please use a ballpoint pen.**

Issue 1

To require courts to consider factors like public safety when setting the amount of bail

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

Proposed by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly

To amend Section 9 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Ohio

A majority yes vote is necessary for the amendment to pass.

The proposed amendment would:

- Require Ohio courts, when setting the amount of bail, to consider public safety, including the seriousness of the offense, as well as a person's criminal record, the likelihood a person will return to court, and any other factor the Ohio General Assembly may prescribe.

- Remove the requirement that the procedures for establishing the amount and conditions of bail be determined by the Supreme Court of Ohio.

If passed, the amendment will be effective immediately.

Issue 2

To prohibit local government from allowing non-electors to vote

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

Proposed by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly

To amend Section 1 of Article V, Section 3 of Article X, and Section 3 of Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio

A majority yes vote is necessary for the amendment to pass.

The proposed amendment would:

- Require that only a citizen of the United States, who is at least 18 years of age and who has been a legal resident and registered voter for at least 30 days, can vote at any state or local election held in this state.

- Prohibit local governments from allowing a person to vote in local elections if they are not legally qualified to vote in state elections.

If passed, the amendment will be effective immediately.

Proposed Tax Levy (Renewal)

Hocking County

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.

A renewal of a tax for the benefit of Hocking County for the purpose of **providing home delivered and dining site meals to older and needy persons of Hocking County through Community Action's Regional Food Center program** at a rate not exceeding one-quarter (0.25) mill for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to two and one-half cents (\$0.025) for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for 5 years, commencing in 2022, first due in calendar year 2023.

Proposed Tax Levy (Renewal)

Hocking County

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.

A renewal of a tax for the benefit of Hocking County for the purpose of **the support of children's services and the care and placement of children** at a rate not exceeding one (1) mill for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to ten cents (\$0.10) for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for 5 years, commencing in 2023, first due in calendar year 2024.
